The People's Atoll - Story of the First Biosphere Reserve of the Maldives



- Baa Atoll in Maldives was recognized as UNESCO Biosphere Reserve at the 40th anniversary event of MAB at Dresden, Germany in June 2011
- February 2013: In response to the Hyderabad Call for Biodiversity Champions to support the Aichi Biodiversity Targets, Government of Maldives pledged to create the entire country and its Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ) a Biosphere Reserve by 2017.
- Government of Maldives is preparing a detailed dossier with support from USAID and IUCN and technical support of UNESCO to be submitted to UNESCO MAB in 2017.





The pledge by the Republic of Maldives in response to the Hyderabad Call for Biodiversity Champions, at the COP 11 in Hyderabad, India, aims to highlight parties' commitment to biodiversity and encourage all stakeholders to dedicate resources for biodiversity in the spirit of Decision XI/4 (review of implementation of the strategy for resource mobilization, including the establishment of targets). The pledge also follows-up on the announcement made by the President of Maldives at the UN Conference on Sustainable Development (UNCSD, or Rio+20), to significantly ramp up efforts to protect the marine environment.

The implementation plan, Maldives as a Biosphere Reserve: An Implementation Plan 2013-2017, sets a roadmap for the period 2013-2017, after which the plan will be updated based on progress and lessons learned. It aims to ensure that over half of the country's atolls are implementing the new approach by the end 2017, in order to trigger the application for Maldives as a Biosphere Reserve to be submitted to UNESCO. Maldives is the second country, after India, to pledge support to the Hyderabad Call for Biodiversity Champions.
